



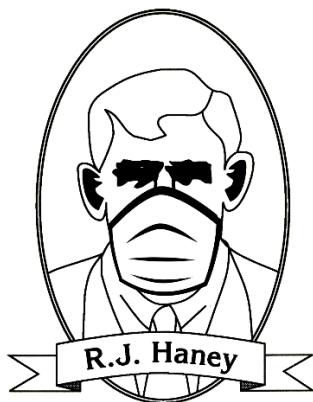
Welcome to R.J. Haney 2021 Scavenger Hunt

Rules:

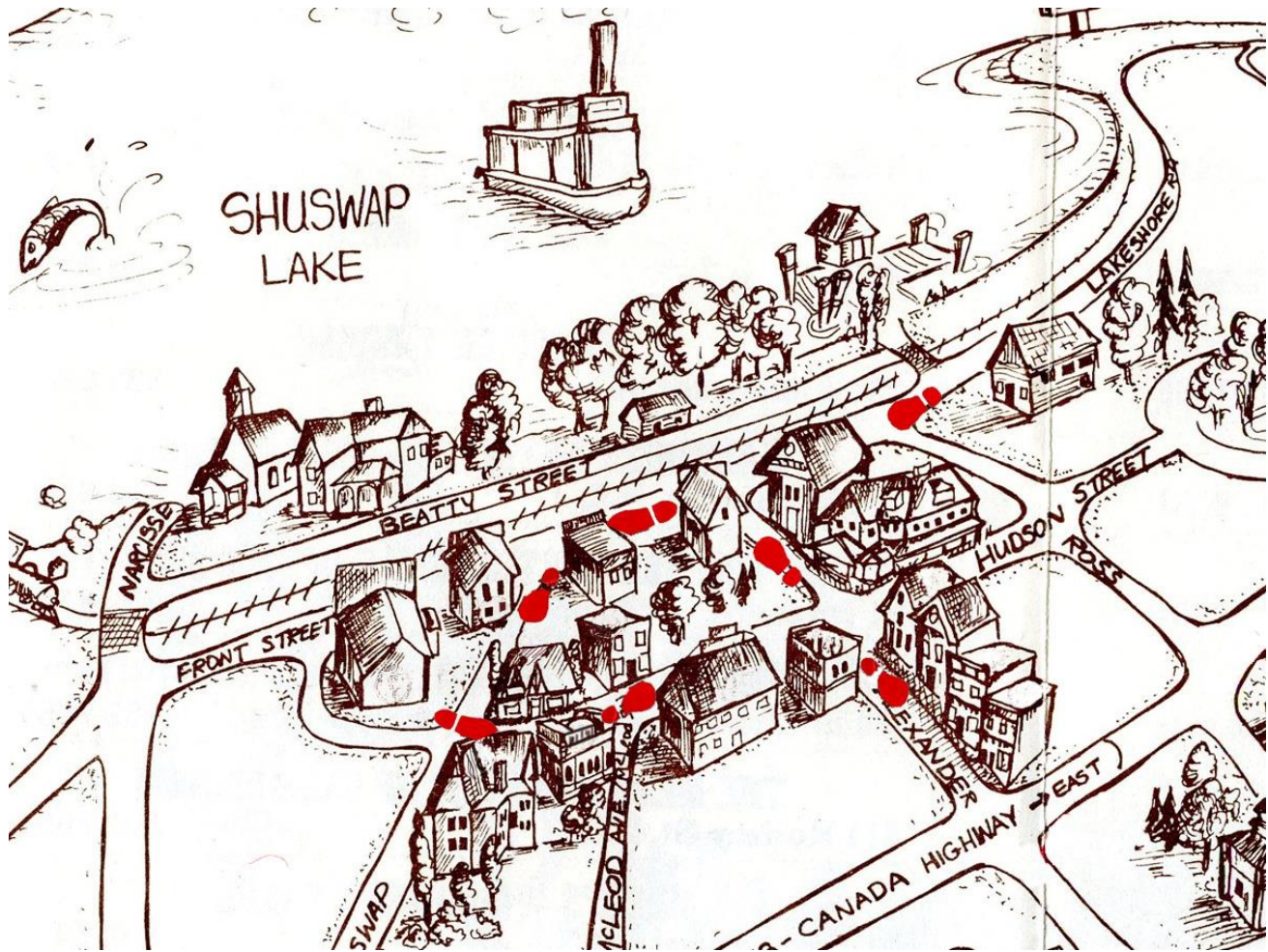
- The goal is to answer all the questions on the list.

Brief History of Salmon Arm

In the summer of 1886, with the construction of the Transcontinental rail service arriving in Salmon Arm, the brewery and gambling hall **Dutch Charlie's** started up. It was located on the corner of Lakeshore Drive and 4th Street. In 1890, Charles McGuire bought it and turned it into a store, eatery and stopover. McGuire later secured the mail contract, and the first post office was established in the area, it was a small shed on the slope above the store.

In 1895, **Cameron House**, Salmon Arm's first hotel, was built. In opposition to the teetotaler farmers in the Valley, hotel owner, J.D. Cameron, opened the area's first licensed bar. The hotel was also the first place to celebrate a Catholic Mass in the area. Later the hotel was renamed Coronation and then The Empress. It was demolished in 1944.

The **Bank of Hamilton** was built in 1906 and was the first financial institution established in Salmon Arm when the community was undergoing its first wave of economic prosperity. The Bank merged with its rival, the Canadian Bank of Commerce, in 1923. It is the original building and is now occupied by Victorian Impression.

The **Montebello Hotel** opened its doors in 1908, and it operated until it was destroyed by fire in 1967. The hotel and its beautiful Victorian gardens filled over one-third of the block. Many long-term residents remember where they were the night the Montebello burned down. The CIBC Bank was later built on part of this site.

Built by William Reader in 1908, this building was known as the **McGuire-Leonard Block**. The Masonic Lodge rented the upper floor for meetings until 1922 when they built their own building. The main floor hosted different businesses, in 1921 became the Quality Store, owned by C.R. Beer, with millinery and dressmaking departments.

In 1890 Salmon Arm got its first **C.P. Railway Station** located on the north side of the tracks. Supporting the historical development and evolution of Salmon Arm, in 1913, a second station was built on the south side of the tracks, where it still stands today, replacing station 1. The railway became an integral part of the community as a means of shipping agricultural products. The station provided passenger service until 1990.

The **Masonic Lodge** was built for this purpose in 1922 and is still in use today.

Built-in 1928, Salmon Arm's original **Municipal Hall** was the first permanent home of the District Municipality of Salmon Arm. From 1970 to 1974, it was used as the library, and the Seniors Citizens Drop-in Centre now occupies it.

In 1929, after fire destroyed the wooden building, R.J. Glasgow, J. Nancollas, and the Palmer Brothers had a building constructed out of concrete. Although the material choice was unusual for the time, the building's commercial character was not. The **Merchants Block** is still used as a commercial property with apartments on the second storey.

Built as **Provincial Government building & Court House** in 1930, this two-storey, brick and stucco building was constructed by well-known local contractor William Reader. Architectural details include gable dormers and half-timbering. It served as a public building until 2007.

Built as a **Post Office**, this one-storey, flat-roofed brick building was designed by Thomas W. Fuller and constructed in 1937 by William Reader. Architectural details include a parapet and cornices. The building served as the public library from 1974 to 1994 until it became the art Centre.

Built-in 1949, the **Salmar Classic Theatre** replaced the ageing Rex Theatre that was located across the street. The theatre is a two-storey, Art Deco style, Quonset hut design building with a thrust stage for community concerts.

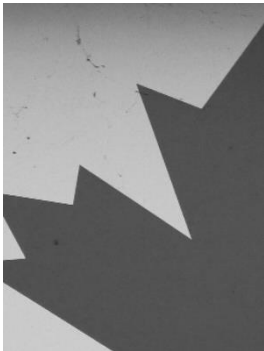
